Native American Day is celebrated falling on September 23 this year, as a way of honoring those who have been a part of the American tradition even before the nation of the U.S.A. came into being, hoping to change the way people view Native Americans and their culture. After centuries of persecution, not much is left of the tribes and many have integrated into modern society. Those still in touch with their roots, will remember these events and honor their ancestor's sacrifices.

History of Native American Day

The observance of Native American Day focuses on the history, heritage, and culture of tribes across the country. Today is all about celebrating the irreplaceable heritage, contributions, and knowledge of the Native American populations. It is also a day to remember the enduring legacy of their fortitude, energy, and strength.

How do you honor Native Americans?

- **Learn more about Native American tribes in your area** – Be respectful of their traditions and take the time to learn their history.
- **Visit a museum** - most museums have a rich collection of Native American artifacts, that reflect Native American arts and culture through the ages.
- **Attend or host an educational event** - Events, parades, and seminars are always a part of Native American Day celebrations. Attend an event near you to find out more about Native American life and traditions.
- **Read the work of Native American authors.**
- **Support native-owned businesses and charities.**

10 Sweet Ways for Kids to Celebrate Grandparents

1. **Create an "I love you because..." list** and read it aloud to Nana and Papa on the big day.
2. **Make their favorite dessert.** Help your child whip up their favorite treat, and decorate with sprinkles, raisins, or nuts for extra flourish.
3. **Have a sleepover.** Pick a day that works for the kids and their grandparents. If overnights aren't possible, have your child schedule a lunch or dinner date instead.
4. **Create a kiss flip book.** Make five or so prints of the photo. Using a red permanent marker, have your child draw one tiny heart on each photo. To bind, punch holes on one side of the photos and tie together with string or pipe cleaners.
5. **Take a walk down memory lane together.** Encourage your child to interview their grandparents about their asking questions like "What did you love to do after school when you were a kid?" "What was your favorite thing to do in the summer?" and "How did you meet each other?"
6. **Make a scrapbook.** Gather up your child's favorite photos, letters, and mementos of their time with their grandparents, and put them in a keepsake scrapbook.
7. **Learn about their hobby.** Have your child spend an afternoon with them doing some of their favorite hobbies.
8. **Customize a t-shirt.** Take the sidewalk chalk drawing your kiddo made of Nana or Papa to the next level by snapping a photo of it and emblazoning it on a t-shirt for them.
9. **Make a photo book.** Print a bunch of your favorite recent pictures, slip them into a blank album and have your child jot a note on the inside cover.
10. **Serenade them with one of their favorite songs.** Teach your child one of their go-to tunes and have them sing it to their grandparents.

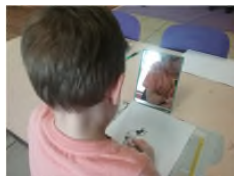
